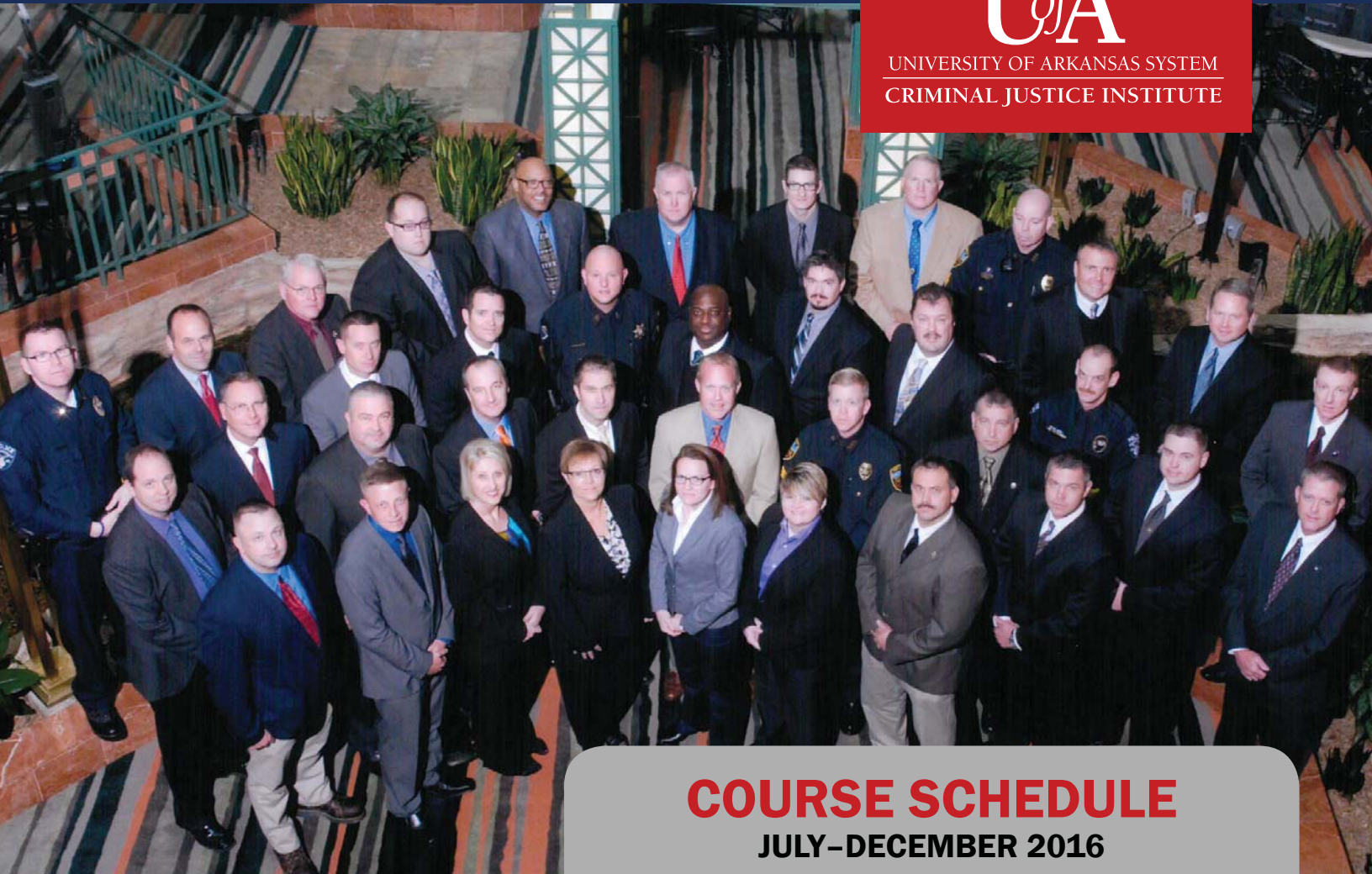

Emergency Closings and Inclement Weather Policy

With the exception of regularly scheduled holidays, the Criminal Justice Institute will be open for business from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Circumstances beyond our control—such as inclement weather, a national crisis, or other emergencies—do occur. On such occasions, the Institute may close for all or part of a regularly scheduled workday.

The Institute will close for inclement weather when the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR) closes. All radio and television stations in central Arkansas will be notified through the UALR Office of Communications when the University is closed. On days declared to be covered by the inclement weather policy, an announcement of a delayed opening will be issued from UALR. Your personal safety is of utmost importance, and careful judgment should be used anytime inclement weather creates hazardous road conditions.

Smoking Policy/Tobacco Use Policy

The Criminal Justice Institute is committed to providing a safe, clean, and healthy environment for our employees and visitors. It is, therefore, CJI policy to provide a tobacco-free work environment. The use of tobacco products (including cigarettes, cigars, pipes, smokeless tobacco, or other tobacco products and electronic cigarettes) is prohibited at all times:

- 1.) in all interior space on the CJI campus, including classrooms;
- 2.) on all outside property or grounds of the CJI campus including partially enclosed areas such as walkways, breezeways, and bus shelters; and
- 3.) in CJI vehicles.

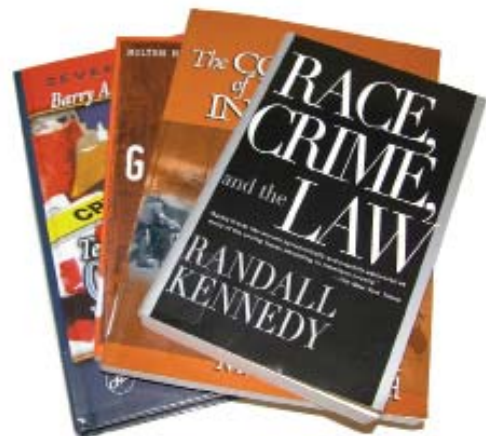
This policy applies to all persons, including employees, faculty, students, visitors, contractors, subcontractors, and others on CJI properties. Signs are posted at all building entrances and displayed in prominent, visible areas advising employees and visitors of this policy. Tobacco-free zones apply on the grounds around all CJI facilities, whether or not signs are posted.

Concealed Carry Policy

Pursuant to Act 226 of 2013, the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System has expressly disallowed the carrying of a concealed handgun by licensed staff members or students within a University of Arkansas building. However, a certified law enforcement officer attending a class at the Criminal Justice Institute may carry a concealed handgun if that officer is: (1) Presently in the employ of a public law enforcement department, office, or agency; (2) Authorized by the public law enforcement department, office, or agency to carry a firearm in the course and scope of his or her duties; (3) Not subject to any disciplinary action by the public law enforcement department, office, or agency; (4) Carrying a badge and appropriate written identification issued by the public law enforcement department, office, or agency identifying him or her as a certified law enforcement officer; and (5) Not otherwise prohibited under federal law.

CJI's Library Services

CJI's Library Services features numerous books, journals, periodicals, training manuals, reference materials, and DVDs/videotapes that can be utilized by law enforcement agencies across the State for in-house training, research, and professional development. Books and DVDs are loaned for a two-week period and can be requested and renewed by phone or email. For those who cannot visit the library in person, items can be mailed with the understanding that the requesting party will be responsible for the return postage only.



Course Registration

Course Eligibility

Most courses and programs of the Criminal Justice Institute are available exclusively to sworn law enforcement professionals **at no cost**. In the event that a CJI course or program will be available to additional professionals within the criminal justice community, notification will be provided within the course or program description.

NON-SWORN LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL AND NON-COMMISSIONED CORRECTIONAL OFFICERS, JAILERS, AND DETENTION CENTER PERSONNEL

For many years, CJI has received requests to make more classes available to non-commissioned correctional officers, jailers, detention center personnel and non-sworn law enforcement professionals. In response, the University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved a fee-structure that allows CJI to expand the catalog of courses that are available to these vital members of the law enforcement community. Some of the courses are available at no cost while others have a small fee. **See pages 54-55 for a complete listing of available programs.**

OUT-OF-STATE OFFICERS

Select CJI courses are available for a fee to officers outside of the State of Arkansas. The expansion of these programs to law enforcement agencies outside of the State will not impact availability of programs for Arkansas law enforcement. However, we cannot guarantee slot availability for registrations received less than two weeks prior to the scheduled date of course delivery. Therefore, please register for classes as early as possible and respond to any course confirmations you may receive.

Course payment must be received no later than three weeks prior to the class start date. Agencies may substitute participants with prior approval only. Refunds will be granted up to 30 days before the date of the course. A \$25 processing fee will be deducted from the total refund amount. Requests for refunds received after this time will be considered on a case-by-case basis only.

Individuals who plan to attend a CJI class must enroll by completing a CJI registration form and submitting it to the Institute. **Please note that enrollments will be accepted no sooner than 90 days prior to the scheduled date of each course.**

Course Materials

Officers who register for a CJI class will be emailed a link to downloadable course materials two weeks prior to the course. Materials will remain available online for one week following completion of the course. Officers are encouraged to bring course materials with them to class, either downloaded to their laptop/smart device or printed from their home/agency. Specialized Seminars, Forums, and Symposiums

CJI continually seeks partnerships, grants and other funding to provide specialized seminars, forums, and symposiums that are of interest to law enforcement and other criminal justice professionals. Law enforcement agencies will be notified of these events through periodic mailings and through notification on the CJI website.

Earn Your Degree! Certificate and AAS Degree Programs for Certified Arkansas Officers



The Criminal Justice Institute collaborates with 21 colleges and universities across the State to expand higher education opportunities for Arkansas law enforcement. Through two unique programs—**Crime Scene Investigation** and **Law Enforcement Administration**—law enforcement personnel can now obtain Certificates of Proficiency, Technical Certificates, and Associate of Applied Science (AAS) Degrees in fields of study specific to the law enforcement profession. (See pages 8-13 for complete details about these programs.)

Both programs of study are available *exclusively* to Arkansas law enforcement officers who are actively employed within a law enforcement agency in the State. To successfully complete a program, participants will be required to take special courses through the Criminal Justice Institute along with general education courses from collaborating colleges and universities. Although officers will be required to pay all tuition and fees of the college or university, college credit for courses completed at CJI will be provided **free of charge** to Arkansas law enforcement personnel, allowing them to complete certificate and degree programs at a fraction of the normal cost. Information concerning financial aid opportunities, including Pell grants, student loans, and workforce improvement grants, can be obtained by contacting the financial aid offices of participating higher education institutions and the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (www.adhe.edu).

Examinations are administered in all CJI courses that are included in the Academic Certificate and AAS Degree Programs. **If you are currently participating or intend to participate in these academic programs, taking these examinations when initially offered is required.**

SCHOOL OF LAW ENFORCEMENT SUPERVISION

The **School of Law Enforcement Supervision (SLES)** provides the tools law enforcement professionals need to advance as supervisors and administrators. This four-week development course is scheduled one week per month over a four-month period, and provides a unique opportunity for professionals to develop and cultivate leadership skills. The instructors are a varied mix of current and former law enforcement personnel, supervisors, attorneys, and field experts whose aim is to bring an understanding of law enforcement management and offer applicable knowledge of how to meet the challenges leaders will face throughout their career. Course topics include: *Leadership and Communications Excellence; Research Strategies; Challenging the Organizational Culture; Organizational and Nonverbal Communication; Stress Management; Social Intelligence; Managing Media Relations; Domestic Terrorism; and Legal topics*. The curriculum includes weekly exams, an oral presentation, and a research paper. The top research papers from each class are posted on the CJI website.

This session of the School of Law Enforcement Supervision will be held in Fayetteville, AR, at the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Letters of nomination are required for officers to attend this specialized course. The nomination deadline is August 5, 2016.

Nominated officers must have reached the minimum rank of sergeant to attend.

CRIME SCENE TECHNICIAN CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The **Crime Scene Technician Certificate Program (CSTCP)** is a series of six fundamental courses that introduce vital components of crime scene investigation. Participants are required to attend and successfully pass all six courses to receive their certificate. Upon completion of the program, participants will have exceeded the minimum requirements necessary to apply for National Crime Scene Certification. To participate, an application letter must be submitted to Dr. Cheryl P. May from your Chief of Police, Sheriff, Department Head or Director indicating how your participation in this program will benefit your agency and state that he/she will support your attendance as well as ensure, to the best of their ability, your participation in all six courses.



ARKANSAS LEADER

The **ARKANSAS LEADER** program, which is designed for chiefs, sheriffs, and other upper-level leaders within a law enforcement agency, takes a multi-faceted, dynamic approach to leadership training. Jointly sponsored by the Criminal Justice Institute and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), this program has been designated a Command College of the FBI. Heads of Arkansas law enforcement agencies who wish to attend or nominate a member of upper management within their agency should direct correspondence to Dr. Cheryl May.

The next session of CSTCP will begin in January 2017.

Applications must be received by end of business on Friday, September 23, 2016.

The next session of Arkansas Leader will be held in June 2017 at the Criminal Justice Institute.

Letter of Nomination must be received by Friday, April 14, 2017.



CJI's Online Programs

CJI's online courses cover a wide variety of topics and can eliminate many of the barriers law enforcement agencies face in finding advanced education and training opportunities for their officers.

Officers who participate in online courses:

- **Spend less time away from their agency...**with classes conveniently available online, they can meet training and education goals without taking time away from work.
- **Reduce travel costs...**online programs completely eliminate fuel, dining, and lodging expenses.
- **Choose their classroom...**courses can be completed at any location—work or home.
- **Move at their own pace...**these programs are available to officers around the clock for a specified period of time.

Registration for online courses follows the same process as other CJI courses. The first step is to submit a registration request form for participation in an online course. Once the request has been processed, officers will receive notification of their enrollment in the course. Officers who have not participated in one of CJI's online courses will be assigned a log-in and password and directed to a special CJI website. Those officers who have participated in an online course will use their permanent log-in and password.

Online versions of CJI courses include features such as slides with audio narration, photographs, graphics, videos, review activities, scenarios, and recommended optional reading. Information about course completion requirements, such as required reading, and the log-in and password are emailed to officers. Course materials will be made available online for enrolled students.

Also, a *Quick Start Guide* is included as an attachment to the log-in email. This guide provides information necessary to successfully complete the online course, including general password information, error elimination, tips on navigating each module or topic within a course, common problems and issues that can occur, and contact information for assistance with any technical difficulties.

Animal Fighting/Animal Cruelty Investigations ONLINE (3 Hours)

This class is designed to help the student become a skilled animal cruelty investigator, learn search and seizure tactics, and improve his/her report writing skills. The program provides an overview of Arkansas's recently expanded Animal Cruelty law and investigative techniques related to animal investigations. Topics such as how to recognize animal cruelty and methods used to train animals will be discussed. Participants will be introduced to different categories of people involved in animal cruelty, clubs and associations that register dogs, and different types of evidence involved in dog and cock fighting cases.

Domestic Violence ONLINE (7 Hours)

This program is designed to familiarize officers with the unique challenges they may face in domestic violence situations. Course topics will include the dynamics of abusive relationships, officer safety concerns, victim interviews, how to handle suspects, children and other witnesses, reporting, and probable cause leading to arrest and successful conviction, as well as a discussion of the use of Laura's Card and the Lethality Assessment which are now required by state law. The course will explore proper evidence collection and documentation, as well as civil orders of protection. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

Ethics for Law Enforcement ONLINE (7 Hours)

LAW ENFORCEMENT PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT:

NEW! Human Trafficking Awareness ONLINE (3 Hours)

The U. S. Department of State estimates that over 14,000 victims are trafficked into the U.S. annually; more than half of these victims are children. This course will define human trafficking, distinguish between trafficking and smuggling, and review the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 as well as the Arkansas Trafficking Statutes. Victims of trafficking are largely hidden from sight by the nature of their condition, which leads to victims being overlooked when they appear in plain sight. Raising awareness of this hidden problem is a key element of this training. This training will describe a victim profile and tactics used for scouting and recruiting victims as well as provide indicators that a person is a victim of trafficking. The course also includes a description of how a victim accepts the lifestyle of a sexually trafficked person. Traffickers will be described using case examples. Officers will also learn how to identify victims and respond to them with a trauma informed approach. The course concludes with information on assistance available and resources for domestic as well as international victims.

Law Enforcement Response to Persons with Behavioral Health Issues ONLINE (7 Hours)

With funding and support from the Arkansas Association of Chiefs of Police, CJI is able to offer this training which is designed to give law enforcement officers a greater understanding of how to interact with individuals suffering from behavioral health issues who they may encounter when policing. Keeping officer safety foremost, participants will explore policies, procedures, and protocols for officers to follow while dealing with this difficult issue. This online course reviews the law related to racial profiling and the challenges of addressing it. Specifically, this online course will provide Arkansas law enforcement officers with racial profiling training that is mandated in Arkansas Statute § 12-12-1404.

ILLICIT DRUG INVESTIGATION AND AWARENESS:

The Arkansas Methamphetamine Challenge for Law Enforcement Executives ONLINE* (7 Hours)

This online course, developed in cooperation with the Arkansas Sheriffs' Association and the Arkansas Association of Chiefs of Police, provides an overview of the meth problem in Arkansas. A management perspective of awareness, employee safety, equipment, training needs, and reporting issues are emphasized to assist law enforcement executives and local municipal officials to most effectively combat meth production and abuse in their communities. Legal and liability issues, online resources, community awareness, drug abuse treatment and effective agency response to drug endangered children are included.

Drug Endangered Children Awareness ONLINE* (7 Hours)

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION:

Crime Scene First Responder for the Uniformed Officer ONLINE (2 Hours)

The actions of first responding uniformed officer directly impacts the solvability and prosecution of criminal cases. Officers can inadvertently lose, destroy, or overlook critical evidence in the performance of their many duties as a first responder. In this course, officers will learn basic techniques for securing a crime scene and how to properly preserve evidence. Common investigative mistakes and solutions will also be discussed. This course is geared toward uniformed patrol officers, though new investigators and crime scene personnel will also benefit. This course was developed in collaboration with the International Crime Scene Investigators Association.

Crime Scene Investigation ONLINE (12 Hours)

This online course provides a basic, introductory overview of crime scene investigation. This course will benefit detectives/investigators, new crime scene specialists, and patrol officers who perform both patrol and investigative duties. **Students will be required to complete *Crime Scene First Responder for the Uniformed Officer ONLINE* prior to registering for this course.**

SCHOOL SAFETY:

Autism Spectrum Disorders: Law Enforcement Response ONLINE (7 Hours)

Therefore, it is vital that officers become skilled in the recognition of behavioral symptoms of these conditions and develop effective communication and response strategies. This course provides fundamental information about what autism is, its associated behavioral characteristics, effective interpretation of behavior, risk management for both the officer and the individual with autism, and communication. It will also address the high victimization rate experienced by people with autism, and provide tips for law enforcement officers charged with preventing and investigating these incidents.

School resource officers are also in a unique position to help identify and eliminate bullying behavior in schools. Knowing how to identify and address bullying behavior is essential to solving the bullying problem. This course is designed to help school resource officers and school personnel define bullying, recognize the warning signs of bullying, learn bullying statistics and myths, identify Arkansas statutory efforts against bullying, identify key roles in bullying events, and learn what schools can do in bullying prevention efforts.

SEXUAL ASSAULT INVESTIGATION:

Introduction To Sexual Assault Investigation For The Rural Investigator ONLINE (21 Hours)*

The response to, and investigation of, sexual assault crimes requires a victim-centered approach as part of an effective investigation. This course is designed to enable rural officers to better understand the impact of sexual assault upon victims as well as apprehend the offender. Course topics include recognizing victim trauma, understanding the medical-forensic exam process, using effective victim interviewing techniques, and strategies for investigating and preparing sexual assault cases for prosecution. All Arkansas law enforcement officers and investigators are eligible to participate in this course, regardless of agency size.

Introduction To Sexual Assault Investigation For The Rural Executive ONLINE (18 Hours)*

Rural law enforcement executives have the opportunity to have a significant influence on those they supervise and on their community's attitude toward sexual assault. They are responsible for creating and maintaining an environment that supports a victim-centered response to sexual assault. This course will enhance the capability of rural law enforcement personnel to manage and investigate sexual assault cases in their community. Course topics include the dynamics of sexual assault, victim trauma, the benefits of a team approach to sexual assault investigation, departmental sexual assault policies and procedures, the medical-forensic examination, alcohol/drug-facilitated sexual assault, media relations, and sexual assault case development from the prosecutor's perspective. All Arkansas law enforcement executives are eligible to participate in this course, regardless of agency size.

FORENSIC SCIENCES AND COMPUTER TRAINING DIVISION

The primary objective of the **Forensic Sciences and Computer Training Division (FSCTD)** is to provide training opportunities for Arkansas law enforcement personnel that enhances their crime solving knowledge, skills, and abilities through coursework and practical exercises in forensic science technologies and computer applications.

Forensic courses are designed to emphasize student participation and competency assessment by providing hands-on exercises and the utilization of state-of-the-art forensic, computer, and educational equipment. The quality of the forensic courses is further enhanced by the expertise and real-world law enforcement experience of our instructors. Through these forensic courses, the Arkansas law enforcement community will continue to acquire skills to help them maximize the identification, documentation, collection, and preservation of physical evidence, ultimately solving more cases, thus enhancing the quality of life for the citizens they protect and serve.

The forensic courses offered range from introductory level classes for newer investigators and patrol officers, to more specialized courses for those who regularly process crime scenes. The courses will provide in-class activities and mock crime scenes to enhance law enforcement personnel's knowledge and understanding of the proper procedures and techniques needed to preserve and document the critical physical evidence in a forensic investigation leading to an arrest and conviction of an offender.

In addition to forensic courses, CJJ's Computer Training courses provide an important avenue for agency heads to ensure their personnel receive the training needed to effectively utilize this technology. With proper training, computer technology can decrease the time required to prepare reports and other administrative documents needed by law enforcement personnel such as data compilation and analysis, case management, database design and management, and communications. FSCTD offers a wide variety of courses to train law enforcement personnel to meet the changing needs of technology as more agencies implement computer applications to facilitate administrative, case management and investigative functions.

FORENSIC SCIENCES/CRIME SCENE

The Forensic Sciences Program at the Criminal Justice Institute enhances the training available to Arkansas law enforcement personnel who perform investigative and crime scene functions for their agencies. Through specialized course offerings taught by nationally and internationally recognized instructors, investigators and first responders can acquire or enhance their knowledge and skills to help maximize the value of physical evidence collected at crime scenes. Combining lecture and practical exercises, investigators learn proper procedures and techniques in the identification, documentation, collection and preservation of critical evidence and, in doing so, ultimately solve more crimes in the communities that they protect and serve.

CJI offers a nationally unique training facility, containing state-of-the-art educational equipment that offers course participants exposure to cutting edge technology. A large lab containing fingerprint processing equipment, 5 indoor mock crime scene rooms, a wooded area utilized for outdoor crime scenes and casting exercises, as well as an outdoor building that can be used for blood spatter exercises, enables the participants of CJI forensic sciences courses to gain invaluable real life training experiences.

BASIC CRIME SCENE PROCESSING (21 Hours)

Processing a crime scene requires numerous skills. This three-day course will employ hands-on exercises focusing on the recognition, documentation, recovery, and preservation of physical evidence. Practical application of the techniques and procedures learned will be demonstrated through a mock crime scene exercise conducted on the last day of the program. This course will benefit patrol officers and new members of crime scene specialty units with minimal crime scene investigation experience. Participants should wear casual clothing that could become soiled during practical exercises. Students are strongly encouraged to bring a digital camera (digital SLR preferred), standard lens, macro lens (if available), batteries for camera and flash, digital media, off camera flash, remote flash cord, tripod, and a flashlight.

BASIC DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY (10 Hours)

Using a combination of lecture, demonstration, and hands-on exercises, this day and a half course will explore basic photography techniques and concepts. These concepts include: camera modes and settings, effective use of light, macro photography, night time photography, and the basics of crime scene photography. Students are **required** to bring a DSLR camera with standard lens, macro lens (if available), batteries/charger, digital media, off camera flash, flash cord, tripod, and flashlight. To incorporate night photography exercises the first day of class will be from 1:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

COMPREHENSIVE EVIDENCE AND PROPERTY MANAGEMENT (21 Hours)

This three-day course provides techniques for effective evidence and property storage and security. Participants will examine several methods and procedures for storing property in order to develop methods for improving the security, control, and disposition of evidence and recovered property. Participants will review policies and procedures for managing physical evidence so that it is admissible in court. Management of technological and electronic evidence, such as evidence from personal computers, cell phones, digital cameras, and digital storage media will be emphasized. *Management of Evidence and Recovered Property* and *Advanced Techniques in Property Room Management* have been combined into this comprehensive class. This course is intended for all sworn and civilian law enforcement personnel having responsibility for the security, control or disposition of evidence and recovered property.

CRIME SCENE FIRST RESPONDER FOR THE UNIFORMED OFFICER ONLINE (2 Hours)

The actions of first responding uniformed officer directly impacts the solvability and prosecution of criminal cases. Officers can inadvertently lose, destroy, or overlook critical evidence in the performance of their many duties as a first responder. In this course, officers will learn basic techniques for securing a crime scene and how to properly preserve evidence. Common investigative mistakes and solutions will also be discussed. This course is geared toward uniformed patrol officers, though new investigators and crime scene personnel will also benefit. This course was developed in collaboration with the International Crime Scene Investigators Association.

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION ONLINE (12 Hours)

This online course provides a basic, introductory overview of crime scene investigation. A general synopsis of forensic evidence and how to properly secure, protect, and process a crime scene will be discussed. Investigators will learn the basics of the proper steps of crime scene investigation from the initial walk-through and scene evaluation to the crime scene documentation that includes note taking, photography, sketching, and final report. Types of evidence and their respective evidence potential will also be discussed. This course will benefit detectives/investigators, new crime scene specialists, and patrol officers who perform both patrol and investigative duties. **Students will be required to complete *Crime Scene First Responder for the Uniformed Officer ONLINE* prior to registering for this course.**

FINGERPRINT CLASSIFICATION, COMPARISON, AND IDENTIFICATION (21 Hours)

This three-day introductory course is designed to teach law enforcement personnel the value and uses of fingerprints for human identification, fingerprint classification and introduce them to the process of comparison and identification. This includes fingerprints of prisoners, wanted persons, or otherwise unidentified persons. Evaluation of crime scene prints will also be discussed so personnel can better determine which prints have value and should be submitted for comparison. Attendees will learn to examine fingerprints during exercises, classify prints, and begin the process of comparison.

Upon completion of this course, students should understand basic principles of classification of fingerprints, NCIC codes, and the use of fingerprints for identification. AFIS and "live scan" technologies will be discussed. This course would be beneficial for jail personnel, supervisors, investigators, booking officers, police officers, and those responsible for detention and release of prisoners wanted by outside jurisdictions. This course will also assist crime scene personnel to properly process for latent evidence, recover higher quality prints and evaluate that evidence at the crime scene so that valuable latent impressions are not discarded.

NEW! SMARTPHONE APPLICATIONS

FOR CRIME SCENES (21 Hours)

They are everywhere and everyone has one: Smartphones. They are word processors, digital cameras, video recorders, and dictation devices all wrapped into one tiny package. This three-day course will introduce the participant to various applications for smartphones and external equipment that can be utilized to document crime scenes. Some of the topics covered include legal parameters, shortfalls, case documentation, and crime scene sketches.

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATOR CERTIFICATE

To provide Arkansas law enforcement personnel with the opportunity to continue their professional growth and development in crime scene investigation, we have developed the **Crime Scene Investigator Certificate**. Earning this certificate requires successful completion of the *Crime Scene Technician Certificate Program*, the *Advanced Crime Scene Technician Certificate Program*, and eight additional specialty courses. A list of all programs included in this program, along with the number of contact hours awarded, is as follows:

In addition, successfully passing at least Level I certification through the International Association for Identification or the International Crime Scene Investigators Association is required.



Due to fiscal considerations, not all courses can be offered in one academic year.

However, it is our strong desire to offer each course during a two-year cycle.

COMPUTER TRAINING

CJI's Computer Training courses assist law enforcement personnel in acquiring the knowledge and skills necessary to effectively utilize computer technology in administrative and investigative activities.

CELL PHONES AS AN INVESTIGATIVE TOOL (14 Hours)

This two-day course will provide investigators with the knowledge of the type of data and evidence that can be stored on cellular devices and the proper procedures for the collection and preservation of cellular devices to maintain the integrity of the data contained within the device. The course will further provide investigators with the proper process for obtaining search warrants for data and cell tower information from cellular devices. The course will also provide investigators with several technological sources used to extract data evidence from these devices and provide investigators with the knowledge and ability to read cellular data records for evidentiary value.

COMPLETE WORD (7 Hours)

Microsoft Word is a full-featured word processing application that enhances professionalism of written communication and documentation. Law enforcement personnel can create templates and forms for agency documents that are used over and over again. Microsoft Word can also be utilized to create graphics and tables for newsletters, notification posts, reports, and brochures. This course is a combination of *Using Microsoft Word* and *Advanced Microsoft Word: Reference Tables, Large Documents, Forms and Templates*.

CYBER CRIMES: THE INVESTIGATIVE RESPONSE (28 Hours)

This four-day basic course is designed to instruct law enforcement officers on techniques in recognizing potential sources of electronic evidence and to safely and methodically preserve and collect items of evidentiary value. Topics include Internet Crimes against Children; Teen Sexting; Cyber Bullying; Identity Theft and Fraud; and Investigating Traditional Crime with Technology Evidence. The course will also include a block of instruction on Federal Child Exploitation Statutes. The course is delivered utilizing a blended learning approach that incorporates instructor-led classroom lecture in conjunction with hands-on computer applications.

USING MICROSOFT EXCEL (14 Hours)

Microsoft Excel allows law enforcement to create professional spreadsheets and charts, and is an excellent program for managing statistics and budgets. Computer users who calculate and chart data would benefit from this course. Major topics to be covered include: *Basic Workbook Skills; Copying and Moving Data; Formatting Text, Numbers and Cells; Working with Columns and Rows; Printing; Creating Basic and 3-D Formulas; Managing Data; Working with Worksheets and Workbooks; Advanced Formulas; Working with Multiple Workbooks; Managing Worksheets: Creating, Editing and Modifying Charts; Comments; and Using Conditional and Custom Formatting.*

LAW ENFORCEMENT MANAGEMENT DIVISION (LEMD)

The primary mission of the **Law Enforcement Management Division (LEMD)** is to enhance the knowledge, skills, and abilities of Arkansas law enforcement professionals by providing training and educational opportunities that enhance professionalism and proficiency. The ever changing demands on the criminal justice system create new and difficult challenges for leaders, supervisors and managers at all levels of law enforcement. LEMD presents courses to meet those challenges and prepare the professional officer for advancement. Course offerings emphasize effective supervision or management within the agency, enhanced interaction with their communities, officer safety, and the development of additional education and skills that benefit the law enforcement profession and the communities they serve and protect.

Courses are scheduled around the State in an effort to provide every officer an opportunity to receive advanced management education and training, eliminating the expense of extended travel. Grants from the Arkansas Attorney General's Office will enable us to continue to offer programs for Animal Fighting/Animal Cruelty Investigations and Officer Safety.

ADVANCED SUPERVISION AND LEADERSHIP (24 Hours)

Management styles may vary among law enforcement managers, but adhering to key supervision principles should not. Individual organizational standards should serve as the backdrop for law enforcement leaders' expectations, and those should be enforced equitably and consistently across the board. *Advanced Supervision and Leadership* aims to give the experienced law enforcement manager the tools he/she will need to continue to advance strong supervision practices. This three-day course will tackle topics such as effective communication skills, leadership that makes a difference, managing problem employees, and stress and the workplace. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers, especially those who are promotable or those who are currently serving as supervisors.

ANIMAL FIGHTING/ANIMAL CRUELTY INVESTIGATIONS ONLINE (3 Hours)

This class is designed to help the student become a skilled animal cruelty investigator, learn search and seizure tactics, and improve his/her report writing skills. The program provides an overview of Arkansas's recently expanded Animal Cruelty law and investigative techniques related to animal investigations. Topics such as how to recognize animal cruelty and methods used to train animals will be discussed. Participants will be introduced to different categories of people involved in animal cruelty, clubs and associations that register dogs, and different types of evidence involved in dog and cock fighting cases.

NEW! BASIC CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS FOR STREET PATROL AND NEW CRIMINAL INVESTIGATORS (14 Hours)

This two-day program is designed to give new investigators the knowledge they need to complete thorough investigations. Although no two investigations are alike, the fundamentals of most are the same. Participants will be introduced to sound investigative practices and procedures that will enhance their ability to collect evidence and prepare for criminal proceedings. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers, but will focus primarily on training new investigators.

BACKGROUND INVESTIGATIONS OF

POLICE APPLICANTS (12 Hours)

Professionalism in law enforcement is the standard; however, abuses by officers can cast a negative light on an organization's reputation with the public. Examining past behavior of officers can sometimes reveal that a pattern of undesirable behavior existed prior to appointment as a police official. This behavior was unknown to the hiring agency due to inadequate or non-existent applicant screening. The integrity and ethical reputation of a police department mandates a thorough background investigation of police applicants. This course offers a systematic approach to background investigations which will assist in making informed hiring decisions. This course is designed for background investigators, supervisors and human resource policy makers.

BASIC CRISIS NEGOTIATIONS (40 Hours)

Hostile environments and crisis situations require that officers are able to diffuse potentially deadly scenarios with the least possible casualties. This forty-hour course is designed to provide law enforcement officers with the necessary tools to communicate with subjects as a trained crisis negotiator in volatile situations. Discussions include: *What to Say and What Should Not Be Said*; *First Responder Negotiations*; *Techniques for Active Listening*; *Techniques for Suicide Intervention*; and *Suicide Prevention for Law Enforcement Officers*. Emphasis will be placed on abnormal psychology theories. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

BULLETPROOF MIND (6 Hours)

The frequency of violence confronting the modern law enforcement officer is alarming. Seemingly friendly confrontations can turn violent at a moment's notice. It naturally follows that law enforcement professionals must develop certain mindsets to ensure their survival. This six-hour course will present pertinent psychological factors that must be embraced. Psychological processes, as well as physical processes, will be addressed to explain officer involvement in confrontational situations. This course will be especially beneficial to tactical team members, firearm instructors, managers, and supervisors of such units.

CASE FILE PREPARATION (6 Hours)

A prosecutable case may be lost in court due to inadequate case file preparation or an insufficient follow-up investigation. Through hands-on training, this course will provide tools for the student necessary to create a professional and adequate case file. The participant will assemble raw data in an effort to illustrate how the arresting officer and the prosecutor must work together in a collaborative manner. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

NEW! CHILD ABUSE INVESTIGATIONS (7 Hours)

Reports of abuse or neglect of children are often investigated by multidisciplinary teams. Law enforcement officers involved in child maltreatment investigations need to know what role they play in the process and what resources are available to them and the families involved. This one-day class, a collaboration of CJJ and the Arkansas State Police, Crimes Against Children Division and the Arkansas Commission on Child Abuse, Rape, and Domestic Violence, aims to strengthen understanding of child abuse prevention and the most effective ways to aid children at risk. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING (6 Hours)

These relationships can be critically important in times of heightened tensions due to crisis situations, as well as in developing effective two-way communication with citizens of the various communities in conducting routine police activities. Insights in developing citizen participation and ineffective law enforcement strategies to build citizen trust and dialog will be presented. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION FOR SUPERVISORS (14 Hours)

Good conflict resolution skills are very beneficial to peers in the workplace; however, it is most important for supervisors to have effective measures in place to solve conflict. Effective communication is one of the simplest, yet most effective, tools supervisors can use for problem solving. This two-day course is designed to aid the participant in developing ways to communicate across differences. By practicing proper communication skills, the supervisor can knock down barriers that may cause turmoil and conflict in agencies. This class is designed for all certified law enforcement officers, but is especially helpful to those in roles of supervision.

COPING WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT STRESS (14 Hours)

Unmanaged stress can be very dangerous for the human mind and body. Policing, by nature, is stressful, and new challenges are presented daily. This two-day class is designed to help officers recognize the danger of stress. The first day of class deals with typical stressors law enforcement officers face. The likelihood of chronic stress in an officer's life and the negative effects it causes will be discussed. Several department studies dealing with officer suicide as a result of stress will be examined in class. Officers will be encouraged to find an outlet in their lives to help them manage the unavoidable stress they will encounter. A licensed psychologist co-facilitates day two of the class. At the conclusion of this course, officers will be able to identify one primary source of stress, identify three additional sources of stress, and recognize the importance of debriefing after stressful situations. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

COURTROOM TESTIMONY (6 Hours)

The arrest of suspects based on probable cause is voided if the arresting officer cannot skillfully and purposefully present his or her evidence in a court of law. This course offers insight on what makes a good witness, what qualifies a witness to be an expert, and what content needs to be included in an expert's testimony. Participants will be given trial testimony hints and tactics for handling drug, property crime, sexual assault, and violent crime cases. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

CULTURAL DIVERSITY (4 Hours)

Diversity is commonplace in the 21st century, yet many struggle with accepting differences. This comprehensive look at cultural diversity aims to explore diversity plans, the bonuses of diversity, and tackle stereotypes. This class is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ONLINE (7 Hours)

Course topics will include the dynamics of abusive relationships, officer safety concerns, victim interviews, how to handle suspects, children and other witnesses, reporting, and probable cause leading to arrest and successful conviction, as well as a discussion of the use of Laura's Card and the Lethality Assessment which are now required by state law. The course will explore proper evidence collection and documentation, as well as civil orders of protection. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

EFFECTIVE REPORT WRITING (6 Hours)

Well-written police reports can be instrumental in solving a case or winning a lawsuit. Reports must be factual and easy to read. This six-hour block of instruction provides a concise and practical presentation of effective narrative report writing techniques for the law enforcement professional. Designed for officers of all experience levels, the program will include lecture, video, and handouts on a wide range of critical writing skills.

ETHICS FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT ONLINE (7 Hours)

Using scenarios, students will utilize tools they acquired in this course to determine if an ethical decision was made.

FIELD TRAINING FOR THE 21ST CENTURY (40 Hours)

Serving as a field trainer is one of the most important roles an officer may have in an agency. This course explores a variety of issues designed to help field training officers manage their probationary employees. Topics include: *Six Functions of the Field Training Officer; Recruit Remediation; Documentation of Recruit Performance; Counseling and Motivation; Critical Training Issues — Cultural Diversity, Use of Force, Sexual Harassment and its Effects on Field Training; and Interpersonal Communication.* **In order to successfully complete the course, the student is required to attend all scheduled instruction and to obtain a passing grade on the final examination.** This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

First-line supervisors are tasked daily with ensuring that officers understand and reflect the vision of the agency and meet the goals set forth by executive management. Adequate training is the most important requirement for developing effective managers, especially those who are newly promoted. This online introductory course is designed to assist first and second line supervisors, or individuals with promotion potential, in developing and applying sound management and leadership principles.

HOMICIDE INVESTIGATIONS (14 Hours)

This course will review homicide and major case investigations, homicide statistics and clearance rates, and types of homicides, as well as crime scene preservation. A comprehensive view of homicide investigations, to include protocol, will start at the initial report of the crime and will include pre-planning for the investigation, procedures to follow and problems to avoid in this type of investigation, and media management for investigators. Additional topics will include: the role of the investigator, the three levels of an investigation: initial investigation, follow-up investigation; and the prosecution; locating and identifying additional crime scenes and potential witnesses; investigative resources; and, factors to look for to assist in the determination of the cause of death. Representative case studies will be presented. The course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

NEW! HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS ONLINE (3 Hours)

The U. S. Department of State estimates that over 14,000 victims are trafficked into the U.S. annually; more than half of these victims are children. This course will define human trafficking, distinguish between trafficking and smuggling, and review the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 as well as the Arkansas Trafficking Statutes. Victims of trafficking are largely hidden from sight by the nature of their condition, which leads to victims being overlooked when they appear in plain sight. Raising awareness of this hidden problem is a key element for training. This training will describe a victim profile and tactics used for scouting and recruiting victims as well as provide indicators that a person is a victim of trafficking. The course also includes a description of how a victim accepts the lifestyle of a sexually trafficked person. Traffickers will be described using case examples. Officers will also learn how to identify victims and respond to them with a trauma informed approach. The course concludes with information on assistance available and resources for domestic as well as international victims.

IDENTITY THEFT (7 Hours)

Identity theft is a criminal act where offenders wrongfully obtain and use personal information of their victims for personal gain. The financial costs associated with restoring one's reputation after identity theft can be hefty and time consuming. This course is designed to teach law enforcement officers to recognize how theft and identity fraud occurs. Strategies for the investigation and prosecution of these cases and available resources to assist victims and investigators will be discussed. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

NEW! IMPLICIT BIAS (7 Hours)

Life scripts, mental tapes of experiences from birth to death, help shape perceptions of others and the world around us. These scripts can at times have deep and unconscious effects on how we react to differences that we see in others. Implicit bias occurs when someone consciously attempts to dismiss prejudice in his or thoughts or actions, but unconsciously holds negative associations of prejudice that have formed over the duration of his or her life. This class will explore how unconscious bias can hinder effective policing. Participants will be encouraged to judge situations and others on their own merits, rather than reacting with automatic thoughts and perceptions. The Implicit Bias training is beneficial for all levels of certified law enforcement officers.

NEW! IN HARM'S WAY: LAW ENFORCEMENT SUICIDE PREVENTION—TRAIN-THE-TRAINER (8 Hours)

In Harm's Way: Law Enforcement Suicide Prevention is an eight-hour train-the-trainer program that provides a comprehensive, holistic approach to stress management and suicide prevention for law enforcement and corrections professionals in order to reduce suicide risk. Those who complete the program return to their departments to train administrators, officers, and staff on suicide prevention, including: warning signs of depression, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and suicide; how to reduce stigma associated with seeking help; and how to develop department policies, protocols, and procedures to address officers at risk. Additional training is provided on the role of employee assistance professionals (EAPs), peer support, chaplaincy, psychological services, family support, and needs of survivors of suicide. *In Harm's Way* was designed with input from many local, state, and federal law enforcement officers, deputies, and troopers, as well as subject matter experts, in order to develop suicide prevention training appropriate for law enforcement agencies of all sizes. *In Harm's Way* has been adapted for corrections officers.

INSTRUCTOR DEVELOPMENT (40 Hours)

Keeping officer safety foremost, participants will explore policies, procedures, and protocols for officers to follow while dealing with this difficult issue. Course topics include identification of common behavioral health issues, officer safety issues, and Interventions.

LEGAL UPDATE (7 Hours)

NEW! THE MALCONTENT COP:

AN INTERVENTION STRATEGY (8 Hours)

Law enforcement administrators often grumble about their "malcontent cops." However, these officers are usually not seen as a defined department problem nor are they identified as a department resource. Every law enforcement agency, no matter how professional or dedicated to its personnel, has a small cadre of individuals who resist organizational direction and try to undermine management direction. They sabotage morale, resist team-building efforts and create a toxic work environment for the unfortunate people who happen to be coworkers. Instructed by Dr. Kevin Gilmartin, a behavioral scientist who specializes in issues related to law enforcement, this class will present a three-pronged intervention strategy for dealing with those persons, to include supervisory training, organizational stakeholder development and training for the malcontent officers.

MANAGING INFORMANTS AND COOPERATIVE WITNESSES (6 Hours)

Proper training is imperative for officers who will interview witnesses who are cooperative. *Managing Informants and Cooperative Witnesses* will specifically address recruitment, documentation, motives, control, legal issues, pitfalls to avoid, and other pertinent issues regarding confidential informants and cooperative witnesses. The supervisor's responsibility in the utilization of informants by his or her subordinates will also be discussed. This course is designed for supervisors, detectives, and all certified law enforcement officers in who work with informants and witnesses.

MANAGING INTERVIEWS AND INTERROGATIONS (7 Hours)

The following topics will be discussed: *REID Nine Steps of Interrogation*; *Common Interview Tactics*; *Criminal Investigations*; and *Definition of a Theme*. The participants will develop the skill to use instruments and tools beneficial in assessing an inmate's risks and needs. This course will describe the various points during an inmate's stay which provide opportunities for the assessment (classification) process. In a concise and convenient format, this online course reviews the laws related to racial profiling and the challenges of addressing it. Specifically, this online course will provide Arkansas law enforcement officers with racial profiling training that is mandated in Arkansas Statute § 12-12-1404. Various investigative techniques of social media sites will be highlighted. Awareness of officer issues related to their own use of social media and privacy concerns will be discussed. New stalking laws in Arkansas, investigative practices, similar crimes associated with stalking, and different types of stalkers will be discussed. This three-hour block of instruction will provide an overview and justification for Self-Aid/Buddy Aid programs and training. Participants will review the history and science behind the development of safety programs, review case studies, and learn key components needed in safety kits. At the conclusion of this course, participants will be able to render a number of safety techniques in potentially life threatening situations. USE OF FORCE (6 Hours)

Law enforcement officers are sworn to uphold the law and must apprehend those who violate it; however, officers are required to use only that amount of force that is reasonably necessary to make the apprehension. When excessive force is used, the officer as well as his/her agency may be held criminally and/or civilly liable. Discussion in this course will focus on case law and legislation which defines the amount of force that is lawfully available to officers in attempted arrest/seizure cases, as well as what the courts have defined as excessive force. Use of force and excessive force will also be considered in the context of high-speed pursuit cases. The officer will be shown methods for improving his or her performance in the courtroom. Case scenarios involving the use of force, deadly force, and high-speed pursuits will be used for class discussion. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

WARRANTLESS SEARCH AND SEIZURE (6 Hours)

Pressing circumstances may lead police officers to conduct warrantless search and seizures; however, this intrusion on one's Fourth Amendment rights can often be justified. This six-hour course reviews law enforcement encounters that lead to the search and seizure of contraband, where the requirements for a search warrant may be over-shadowed by other criteria. A review of pertinent court cases will be introduced to illustrate situations where warrantless searches and seizures may be authorized. Current trends in the law of search and seizure will be discussed. This course is designed for all certified law enforcement officers.

ILLICIT DRUG INITIATIVE

Methamphetamine use and abuse continues to be a problem for law enforcement across the state. Although clandestine labs are still present, the majority of meth brought into Arkansas is manufactured in Mexican “super labs.” Due to its cheaper price and high purity, it is in high demand by drug dealers and users. With Arkansas being primarily a transit state, users and trafficking statistics have remained high, but steady over the last several years. These trafficking activities still pose challenges and safety concerns for officers implementing enforcement activities.

Through the Special State Asset Forfeiture Fund, CJJ will continue to make methamphetamine a key training priority for fiscal year 2017. The classes scheduled will provide a variety of curricular content and cover such topics as surveillance, highway drug interdiction, search warrant preparation, undercover operations, hotel/motel interdiction, planning and executing search warrants, drug recognition, and consensual encounters. The classes to be presented have been developed by narcotics officers and interdiction specialists with decades of experience in their fields.

Through federal funding, CJJ will continue to offer online methamphetamine-related courses each month for increased access and availability.

The Illicit Drug Initiative will deliver several courses for the first time during fiscal year 2017. *Planning and Executing Search Warrants* will be offered during the first half of FY17 and will cover the proper preparation, assessment, planning, and execution of search warrants. Additionally, participants will participate in a practical exercise to reinforce the intelligence gathering and planning skills learned during lecture.

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THE ARKANSAS METHAMPHETAMINE CHALLENGE FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT EXECUTIVES ONLINE (7 Hours)

This online course, developed in partnership with the Arkansas Sheriffs' Association and the Arkansas Association of Chiefs of Police, provides an overview of the methamphetamine problem in Arkansas. A management perspective of awareness, employee safety, equipment, training needs, and reporting issues are emphasized to assist law enforcement executives and local municipal officials to most effectively combat methamphetamine production and abuse in their communities. Legal and liability issues, online resources, community awareness, drug abuse treatment and effective agency response to drug endangered children are included.

CONSENSUAL ENCOUNTERS (7 Hours)

Consensual encounters are the least intrusive form of police-suspect interaction, but a highly valuable tool in anti-drug efforts by law enforcement. This seven-hour course will focus on proactive, non-adversarial techniques that may be used by law enforcement to gain consent to search from those suspected of possessing or trafficking illegal narcotics and, in the absence of consent, will show participants how to determine reasonable suspicion and probable cause from these brief encounters. Topics included in this course will include common types of consensual encounters, Arkansas rules, interpretation of the target's nonverbal, verbal, and behavioral indicators, preparation and planning, applications in domestic drug interdiction, documentation, and legal issues.

CRIMINAL INTERDICTION (21 Hours)

This three-day course of instruction educates officers on the importance of effective highway interdiction. Participants learn the significance of going beyond the traffic stop by asking simple questions and paying attention to indicators of criminal activity. The importance of these indicators and current trends are outlined throughout the course. This course includes elements such as drug and criminal activity detection, proper observance of search and seizure laws, contamination issues, and ethical conduct. Information shared relates to what is commonly observed in Arkansas among active law enforcement.

Illicit Drug Initiative

CRIMINAL PATROL & DRUG RECOGNITION (7 Hours)

This seven-hour block of instruction is broken into two parts. The first block, criminal patrol, teaches officers ways to stop/approach vehicles and how to observe and interview subjects to find out if criminal activity is afoot. Officers will learn how to go further than a traditional traffic stop by asking questions and paying attention during the stop for indicators of criminal activity. This class will teach the officers noticeable signs and cues to watch for while interacting with driver/passengers, as well as, how to interview these subjects once the stop is made.

The second block, drug recognition, teaches officers about the seven drug categories according to the Drug Recognition Expert curriculum. Officers will be able to identify the categories, know common drugs associated with each category, identify common paraphernalia used with each category, signs and symptoms, and learn about new drug trends. *(This course was formerly known as Recognition of Drug Paraphernalia and Impairment.)*

DRAFTING SEARCH WARRANTS & AFFIDAVITS (20 Hours)

Properly prepared search warrants are the basis for strong cases. This course presents the Search and Seizure Warrant and Affidavit requirements of the 4th Amendment and the Arkansas Rules of Criminal Procedure. Class discussions will include narcotics buy warrants, obtaining "No Knock" exceptions, and working effectively with Prosecutors and Judges. Scenarios are utilized to provide practical exercises to reinforce the information presented in class. Each student is required to prepare Search and Seizure Warrants and Affidavits based upon the information gathered during the scenarios. These documents will be reviewed by the instructors and feedback will be provided to each officer.

DRUG ENDANGERED CHILDREN AWARENESS ONLINE* (7 Hours)

This course examines the need and advantages of collaborative working arrangements at the local level between law enforcement, Division of Children and Family Services and other social service agencies when working cases that involve children living in homes where illegal drug activities occur. Participants will learn the history of the DEC movement nationally, the general history of drug use in the U.S., the effects and dangers of children living in homes where drugs are being used, manufactured or sold, drug recognition information and the advantages of local collaboration when dealing with DEC cases. Information about the Arkansas DEC Alliance will be shared and the Arkansas definition of drug endangered children will be explained.

HOTEL/MOTEL INTERDICTION (7 Hours)

This program provides classroom presentations and scenario-based training in the interception of narcotics in the hotel/motel industry. It outlines proven techniques utilized to assist narcotic officers and uniformed officers in developing partnerships with the business community in identifying violators who use legitimate businesses, such as hotels, to facilitate narcotic trafficking and other criminal activity. The course will outline comprehensive investigative techniques to identify conduct and behavior of the drug violator in the hotel/motel setting. The program also provides instruction on knock & talks, currency seizures, and the role of the narcotic canine. Practical exercises will be used to reinforce these investigative techniques. In addition, legal foundation for the techniques, to include constitutional procedure, search and seizure, and Fourth Amendment issues, will also be covered.

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NEW! PLANNING & EXECUTING SEARCH WARRANTS (7 Hours)

This program provides classroom guidance for the assessment, planning, and execution of search warrants. Attendees will learn and discuss the utilization of various forms of intelligence as well as the physical logistics needed to safely conduct a police operation, specifically enforcement actions such as the execution of search and seizure warrants. A team driven practical exercise will be conducted to reinforce the intelligence gathering and planning. Teams will assess given real-life scenarios and collection of independent intelligence needed for the incident and conduct an “operational briefing” specific to their task. This class will be a valuable lesson for officers currently assigned to any investigative division or entry team, where they may be required to participate in the development of an operational plan.

SURVEILLANCE FOR RURAL & URBAN OFFICERS (14 Hours)

Participants will be able to apply skills learned in the classroom during scenario based practical exercises. Vehicle and foot surveillance pros and cons will be examined. Case criteria for surveillance operations will be explored through discussion and case examples. Topics will include: Photography, Disguises, Equipment, Planning and Extraction. This training will be practical exercise and scenario based, with a minimum amount of lecture.

UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATIONS (14 Hours)

Topics will include the selection process for undercover agents, planning and executing undercover operations, drug interception investigative techniques, the use of informants, building and maintaining an undercover identity, search warrants, evidence handling, effective documentation and report writing, and legal considerations. To better prepare participants to manage the dangers inherent to covert operations, emphasis is placed on risk management. This class is suitable for both new and experienced officers currently investigating narcotics offenses, and officers anticipating drug investigative assignments in the future.

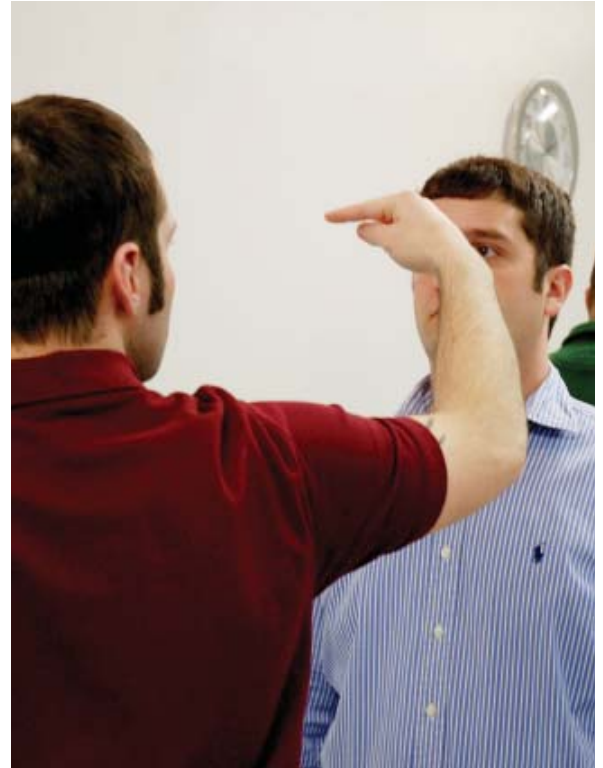
TRAFFIC SAFETY PROGRAM

The Arkansas State Police Highway Safety Office provides grant funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to support the Criminal Justice Institute's Traffic Safety Law Enforcement and Prosecutor Training Project, the central source of nationally recognized traffic safety certification courses for Arkansas law enforcement. The law enforcement liaisons participate in national and state law enforcement conferences. Incentive awards are provided to agencies that participate in these campaigns.

SAFE SCHOOLS PROGRAM

The **Safe Schools Program** provides education, training, resources and technical assistance to all Arkansas law enforcement and education professionals responsible for school safety. CJI's comprehensive catalog of school safety courses assists in reducing violence and violence-related behaviors in Arkansas schools. A proactive approach to responding to crime and violence, both on the school campus and within the community, is emphasized.

Through a grant award from the U.S. Department of Justice–Office of Community Oriented Policing and funding from the Arkansas Attorney General's Office, the Institute provides basic and specialty school safety training courses for law enforcement (including school resource officers) and school personnel (including administrators, teachers, staff, counselors, and school security officers). CJI's school safety programs are designed to address the unique needs of Arkansas schools and communities. In addition, there are no registration fees for CJI classes which allow educators to earn professional development hours at no cost to their school districts.

In conjunction with the Arkansas Safe Schools Association, the Arkansas Attorney General's Office, the Arkansas Department of Human Services, and the Arkansas Department of Education, the Criminal Justice Institute co-sponsors an annual statewide safe schools conference. This partnership is aimed at providing cutting edge training in school safety and its newest technologies to law enforcement, school administration, school security, or anyone responsible for school safety or emergency response.

Thanks to funding from the Arkansas General Attorney's Office, the Criminal Justice Institute offers a *Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE)* course, which provides strategies, guidance, and a plan for surviving an active shooter event. This four-hour program can be delivered on-site to school districts by request.

ACTIVE KILLER: RESPONSE FOR EDUCATORS (6 Hours)

The purpose of this training is to provide educators and others working in an educational setting with information to better prepare for and respond to an active killer event. This training will examine various active killer events that have occurred throughout the years so as to better understand techniques, tactics, and policies that may be employed in a school environment when dealing with an active killer incident. Educators will also learn what to expect from first responders who will be responding when active killer events occur. Discussion regarding the aftermath of an active killer event will also take place.

ACTIVE SHOOTER/RAPID RESPONSE TRAINING LEVEL I (14 Hours)

Topics include the history of active shooter situations and instruction on immediate deployment, rapid intervention tactics, and techniques used in rescue and contact team situations. Day two of the training will include practical exercises using Simunitions in mock scenarios to gain experience in applying the tactics and techniques learned in the classroom.

AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDERS:

Law enforcement officers will inevitably come into contact with an ever-growing population of individuals with autism. Therefore, it is vital that officers become skilled in the recognition of behavioral symptoms of these conditions and develop effective communication and response strategies. This course provides fundamental information about what autism is, its associated behavioral characteristics, effective interpretation of behavior, risk management for both the officer and the individual with autism, and communication. It will also address the high victimization rate experienced by people with autism, and provide tips for law enforcement officers charged with preventing and investigating these incidents.

CHANGING THE SCHOOL CLIMATE ONE LEADER AT A TIME (5 Hours)

While much focus has recently been given to the physical safety of school campuses, the social or emotional safety of the school campus is not always given as much attention. The climate on a school campus can have a significant impact on the safety of that campus as well. School climate can be enhanced on any campus through the building of positive relationships with staff, students, parents and community members. This class is a dynamic and collaborative presentation which is taught by a school administrator and a school resource officer. Topics to be discussed include effective use of the SRO triad concept, strategies for building positive relationships with students, the importance of community events and their impact on the school and the evolution of social media and its effects on the students and climate of the school. This presentation will also focus on ways to develop student leaders from students displaying "at risk" or "troubled" behaviors.

Law enforcement officers and agencies are frequently being asked by schools for direction and presentations on what they should do if confronted with an active shooter event. The Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) course was designed and built on the Avoid, Deny, Defend strategy developed by ALERRT in 2004. This training provides strategies, guidance and a plan for surviving an active shooter event. Topics include the history and prevalence of active shooter events, the role of professional guardians, civilian response options, medical issues, and drills. This training will include both classroom presentations and scenarios which will allow school personnel to participate in drills.

NEW! CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (CPTED) FOR SCHOOLS (21 Hours)

This course allows participants to use advanced Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) strategies and solutions to promote safety, orderly behavior, and a reduction of fear in the school environment. There are technical sessions on transportation, signage, landscaping, and lighting. Additionally, participants are guided through a comprehensive school assessment process followed by a real assessment of a school. Working in teams, participants will develop, prioritize, and present feasible recommendations for improving safety and comfort of students and staff. This training will prepare participants to examine and apply the principles of CPTED to a school environment, to develop and apply strategies and present recommendations for improving the safety and security of schools.

School resource officers are also in a unique position to help identify and eliminate bullying behavior in schools. Knowing how to identify and address bullying behavior is essential to solving the bullying problem. This course is designed to help school resource officers and school personnel define bullying, recognize the warning signs of bullying, learn bullying statistics and myths, identify Arkansas statutory efforts against bullying, identify key roles in bullying events, and learn what schools can do in bullying prevention efforts.

PLANNING, CONDUCTING AND ANALYZING EMERGENCY CRISIS

PLANS: FROM TABLETOP TO FULL DRILL (7 Hours)

Crisis planning is a vital part of school safety and schools should review and practice their crisis plans often. In this course, participants will learn how to plan, conduct and analyze a tabletop version of their Emergency Action Plan, utilizing all vital personnel. Instruction will be given as to what agencies should attend, what concepts need to be covered as well as possible scenarios to be considered. Participants will then be instructed on how to take lessons learned from the tabletop version and create a full-scale drill in order to test their action plan. This will enable participants to further identify any weaknesses in their action plan and make appropriate adjustments, therefore ensuring the maximum safety of their school facilities and campus. Participants will also receive instruction on Site Assessments to measure the current safety level of their facility.

This course is designed to provide newly appointed school resource officers with the knowledge and skills they need to effectively understand and perform these important roles.
